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Soso Dumbadze (1981) lives in Cologne, works in Cologne and Tbilisi. From 1998 to 2002 he studied TV and film directing at Tbilisi State University and from 2004, at the Academy of Media Arts Cologne where he received a diploma in 2011. His works were presented at the following exposition spaces and exhibitions: Bundeskunsthalle, Art Cologne, New Talents -Biennale, Haus am Lützowplatz Berlin and others. His video installation The Parallel (2012), which analyzed the media representations of power on the example of the inaugurations of presidents Saakashvili and Putin, was acquired by the Culture Department of the City of Cologne, under the curatorship of Barbara Engelbach from the Ludwig Museum. The video installation A Yellow Bus (2017) addressing homophobia in Georgia using materials depicting the events of May 17, 2013 in Tbilisi was covered by Frieze and Frankfurter Allgemeine Zeitung. His diploma film Sunny Night (2017) about the Georgian Orthodox Church and its power within the political landscape of Georgia, co-directed with Lea Hartlaub, premiered at Dok-Leipzig festival. In parallel, Dumbadze has been working on his PhD project, The Georgian Silver Age (working title), at the University of Fine Arts of Hamburg, which examines Georgian-Russian and European avantgarde cinema and it's meaning for the political essay film, for which he has been awarded the Friedrich-Ebert-Foundation scholarship. In 2006 Soso Dumbadze founded Sazogadoebrivi Gamomtsemloba Sa.Ga. (Publishing for Society), which he has lead ever since. Since its founding Sa.Ga. has published 15 books, including works by authors such as Theodor W. Adorno and Walter Benjamin, Sergei Eisenstein and Dziga Vertov, Pier Paolo Pasolini, as well as Harun Farocki, Chris Marker and others.

Nino Dzandzava (1983) studied at the Shota Rustaveli Theater and Film State University of Georgia from 2001 till 2006, where she obtained a Master's Degree in film studies. From 2010 to 2011, she completed a film conservation course at the L. Jeffrey Selznick School of Film Preservation (George Eastman House – International Museum of Photography and Film, Rochester, New York). Dzandzava has worked as a film critic and cultural commentator for various magazines and newspapers in Georgia. She has also published academic and research papers in magazines and catalogs internationally. From 2006 to 2009, she was involved with the Tbilisi International Film Festival. While working at the Film Heritage Department at the Georgian National Film Center (2006-2009), she carried out several film preservation projects and helped develop the database for the National Filmography Web Portal: www. geocinema.ge. Dzandzava interned at the Anthology Film Archives in New York and at the Haghefilm Foundation in Amsterdam. She is currently, the Deputy Director of the Central Archive of Audio-Visual Documents at the National Archives of Georgia. She curates photographic exhibitions in various institutions in Georgia (including the Dimitri Shevardnadze National Gallery and Giorgi Leonidze State Museum of Literature) and researches photography in Georgia. In 2013, she collaborated with the Sa.Ga. publishing house as the scientific editor of a monograph about one of the pioneers of Georgian cinema. Germane Gogitidze. called From the Past of Georgian Cinema.

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
